Staff at Sunflower House are often asked, "Isn't it hard to work each day around such heartbreaking stories and circumstances? How do you do it?"

The answer is simple. "Each day, we focus on the good being done rather than on the struggle of those we help," says Cindy Riddel, Director of Child Assessment. "Instead of only hearing their tragic stories of abuse, we soak in their smiles and honor the connection being made and the courage it takes for each child to tell his or her story. We listen and then we help."

2017-18 was a difficult year for the team. An astounding 554 children were referred to Sunflower House for a forensic interview with a few very difficult cases handled that made an impact on the staff. 49 percent of the cases were from Johnson County, 47 percent from Wyandotte, and 4 percent from elsewhere. Three out of four were females and they ranged in ages from three to 18 years old.

77 percent of referrals were based on allegations of sexual abuse or sexual exploitation, 15 percent severe physical abuse, and eight percent having witnessed a violent crime.

Partly what keeps our staff going is having the opportunity to see children come back to Sunflower House for therapy because we know that this means that these children have hope for their future. They have a fighting chance to get past the abuse they have endured. In this past year, 272 therapy intakes were completed and 2400 hours of therapy provided through a contract with PACES that is made possible by the federal Victims of Crime Act grant.

SUNFLOWER HOUSE PREVENTION EDUCATION TEAM

While we are very proud of the work that we do for children and their families following their report of abuse, we feel strongly that just as important is educating the community about child abuse to ensure that reports are made sooner and children are taught that they have a voice and the power to speak up.

The Sunflower House prevention education program has been looked to for our expertise in child abuse prevention for more than 30 years--often being called on to present at state and national conferences. The Happy Bear play continues its important work by educating children -- more than 12,000 in the last school year -- about recognizing an unwelcome touch and about not keeping secrets from trusted adults. And we are getting more and more opportunities to follow up with children at other ages when they are vulnerable to sexual abuse, and help professionals learn how to recognize and report abuse.

In 2017-18, Sunflower House continued to work toward its goal of reaching 11,000 parents in our community with the message that child abuse is preventable and it is our responsibility, as adults, to protect the children in our lives. We have been doing that through our Child Protection Project presentation, where our staff will come out to any group of adults to provide this free one-hour presentation that was developed using solid research-based prevention tips along with the stories from local families who have experienced the trauma of the sexual abuse of their children.


